
Palmarum is the Latin word used by the Church for Palm Sunday, one of two Sundays of the Church Year on which we remember the Lord's Triumphal Entry into Jerusalem, as recorded in Matthew 21:1-9. This Gospel text is read during the processional in which the members hold palm branches, as did the saints of old, calling out "Hosanna", "Save now!"

A fresco in the the Collegiate Church of Santa Maria Assunta, San Gimignano, Italy. The minor basilica of San Gimignano dates to the middle of the 10th century. It is built in the Romanesque style. The frescos, paint applied to wet lime plaster, were added in the 13th, 14th and 15th centuries. The frescos were done by painters from Sienna, and show Byzantine influence in the style of Duccio, as well as early Renaissance influence in the style of Giotto.
